



CDV -- Standing view of a young cavalry trooper with shell jacket and drawn saber resting at his front. Young teenaged soldier whose image is identical to another from a Company M only album. Came with Collection #512 and is presumed to also be from Co. M.

Image is in fine condition with two minor losses at lower corners, not affecting image. No backmark, but 2¢ revenue stamp. #513. **\$400**



CDV – Standing view CDV of Private **Henry H. Fillebrown**, the first man to sign the enlistment roll for the Cal Hundred. He enlisted at age 19, on October 28, 1862 as a private, from San Francisco to go east and fight with the 2nd Massachusetts Cavalry. His occupation was listed as "vaquero."

Image has "Higgins & Johnston" backmark. Fillebrown is standing with saber drawn and at rest. His forage cap bears crossed sabers on the face, but is absent any other insignia. Collection #514. **SOLD**



CDV – Seated view of **John C. Norcross** who was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant of Co. M, the guidon company, on March 19, 1863. He enlisted with the Cal Battalion and journeyed east to fight with the 2nd Mass Cavalry. On July 12, 1863 he was in a fight at Ashby's Gap and was captured by Mosby (mentioned in Collection #368). He went to rebel prison camps for most of the war, finally escaping on March 15, 1865.

CDV is very fine with Holyland, Washington D. C. backmark, excellent contrast, probably photographed after his return to the regiment and having received his captain's commission. Collection #515. **SOLD**



CDV – Vignette view of **Josiah A. Baldwin**, a trooper in Co's. L and M of the 2nd Mass Cavalry. Baldwin, a close friend to the founding officer of the Cal Hundred, J. Sewall Reed, enlisted at the age of 35 as a second lieutenant mustering into Co. L. He was wounded at Cedar Creek on October 19, 1864 but survived the war.

CDV is in fine condition with small corner clips, J. W. Black backmark and ink signature, "*Lt. Josiah A. Baldwin, Co. M 2d Mass Cav Formerly Co. L.*" Collection #516. **\$500**



CDV - seated view of **James Watson**, the 101st of member of the Cal Hundred, having won his place the night before departure when another member was discharged for drunkenness. Watson, a ferrier by trade, was the only native born Californian to fight in the Civil War. He enlisted on December 9, 1862 in San Francisco. During the war, his horse was shot and fell on top of him, dislodging his shoulder.

At war's end, Watson had been promoted to Corporal. He was sent down to Richmond where he rode in a 25-man escort with President Lincoln through the captured city. Watson is in civilian attire, CDV with A. G. Lewis, Portland, Maine backmark. Collection #517. **SOLD**
